


Servants and workers in 19th-century China

#### Edw'd. B. Drew,

Edward Bangs Drew received his BA and MA degrees from Harvard. He joined the Chinese Maritime Customs Service in 1864 and was appointed commissioner in 1868. He was later appointed by the Kuang-hsü emperor (光緒) to serve as secretary of the Chinese embassy on Special Ambassador Li Hung-chang's (李鴻章) visit to the U.S. in 1896. Drew retired from the Customs Service in 1908 and returned to live in Massachusetts where he died in 1924. He was married to Anna Davis and five of their six children were born in China.

During that time he worked as a commissioner in China, Drew collected photos that document clothing, customs, and daily life in 19th-century China. All photos in this booklet are part of online photo collections of Edwards Bangs Drew Chinese Maritime Customs Service Photographs at the Harvard-Yenching Library.

Born in 1851 in Medfield, Massachusetts, Anna Davis married Edward Bangs Drew in 1865. That same year they went to China, where her husband became commissioner of customs in the Chinese Maritime Customs Service from 1868-1908. They had six children.







## Domestic workers

Marginal groups, such as domestic servants, are part of the photograph collection, but with limited information about the individuals. They were included in the documentation for their functions within the imperial and Western families, such as caregivers, and cultural values, such as the traditional clothing they were wearing.



# Amah

Amah (阿嬷) in Fujian dialects, also called Min Chinese, means nanny or a senior woman. It is also an informal name for grandmothers, like granny. 阿嬷


Title: Charlie's amah, a Foochow

woman

Place: Fuzhou, Fujian Sheng, China

Creation Date: 187-?

The woman was the nanny of Edward Drew's son, Charlie Drew, while the Drew family resided in Fuzhou, Fujian, China. Edward Drew possibly planned for this photo shoot and let Charlie's Amah know beforehand as the woman was seated in a photography studio, dressing up, wearing hair accessories and holding a fan as a prop.



Title: Assu, the Drew family's

Description: Edward Bangs Drew family amah (domestic servent), Assu, who came with the family when Drew retired from the Chinese Maritime Customs Service and returned to the U.S.

Place: China

Creation Date: 1891

In the Edward Bangs Drew collection, Assu was presented with the most photos, a total of three, and with the most personal information among all the workers.

Description: Edward Bangs Drew family amah (domestic servent), Assu, who came with the family when Drew retired from the Chinese Maritime Customs Service and returned to the U.S.

Place: Beijing, China

Creation Date: 1890 March 9

Assu's photos were presumably all taken in Beijing since the creation dates were between 1890 and 1891. In addition, the interior design of the house remained the same, and Assu dressed in similar layers in March 1890 and April 1891.

Creation Date: 1891 April

Assu became unidentified here, labelled by her gender, ethnicity, clothing and surroundings. She was possibly photographed quickly without much time for preparation.



The Chinese woman was likely Mr Flayelle's family servant since the entire family were in the photo. She stood right next to the family, but with some distance. Unlike the rest of the group, she stood in a natural position without any poses and wore a practical outfit. It seems like it was a last-minute decision of the Flayelle family to stop her from her domestic work and include her in this photo.

Title: Little sew-sew amah

Place: China

Creation Date: 1891

Little sew-sew could be the name of this female domestic servant or the name of the child whom the woman was caring for. Sew-sew appears to be the phonetic spelling of the name, and it sounds like a typical Chinese last name, Su (苏). She seemed to be going somewhere with a letter but got stopped for a photo. She possibly felt uncertain about being photographed based on her facial expressions and the gesture of raising one hand in front of her body. She had bound feet.



Title: Wealthy merchant and family, Ningpo.

Place: Ningbo, Zhejiang Sheng, China
Creation Date: between 1878 and 1880

Domestic Chinese workers were common not only in Western households but also in wealthy Chinese families. These servants often had a lower socio-economic status. In this photo, the woman with a toddler in her arms was likely a nursemaid. She was only the person who sat on the top step rather than a chair and dressed in plain clothes. She was not foot-bound, unlike the rest of the female family members. (Foot binding is more typical in the upper class than in the working class.)

Title: Sup Kem and family

Description: Sup Kem, head of household staff for the Edward Bangs Drew family, pictured in back row (second from right), with his wife (second from left), daughter (far right), adopted son (far left), and, in front row, two nephews and another adopted son (center).

Place: Fuzhou, Fujian Sheng, China

Creation Date: 1906

While the adults managed to pose for the camera with some neutral facial expressions, the children disclosed some genuine emotions. They looked concerned and even a bit frightened about the situation.




Title: Sup Kem and his family

Description: Sup Kem, head of household staff for the Edward Bangs Drew family, pictured standing in back row, fourth from left. Portrait includes his nephews and nieces with their children.

Place: Fuzhou, Fujian Sheng, China

Creation Date: 1906

Sup Kem's wife is pictured in the second row (fourth from left), with Sup Kem's daughter (third from left), daughter (far right), and adopted son in the front row (fourth from left).

Title: Three unidentified Chinese women in

traditional dress, sitting in chairs

Place: China

Creation Date: 190-?

Sup Kem's wife is unidentified here, sitting beside two other women, who were likely in a close relationship with Sup Kem's family. The creation time of this photo should be 1906 since Sup Kem's wife seemed to be the same age as her in the other two family photos. They were labelled for the traditional Chinese clothing they were wearing. Presumably, the centre woman held the highest socio-economic status among the three, and she was also posing with a delicate water pipe used for smoking opium.





Title: Chinese servants

Place: Ningbo, Zhejiang Sheng, China Creation Date: between 1878 and 1880

The servants arranged their standing positions likely based on traditional Chinese family values. For example, the most senior female servants sat on the front chair while the young men stood at the back out of respect for the elderly. Their facial expressions seemed either unsettled or tense as they were captured by the camera. This photo is one of the rare occasions when servants were gathered for a group photo dedicated to them though little description was documented.





# Sedan Chair Bearers and Grooms



Title: Ordinary sedan chair, Ningpo
Description: Anna Drew sitting in sedan

chair with son Charles.

Place: Ningbo, Zhejiang Sheng, China
Creation Date: between 1878 and 1880


The carrier dressed in the government's official uniform. Two of them were carrying the sedan while one stood on the side to provide any support or protection for Anna Drew and her son, Charles Drew. All three of them were facing towards the camera, posing together with Anna and Charles.



**Title:** Unidentified man standing in front of woman sitting in sedan chair with two Chinese bearers, Canton

Place: Guangzhou, Guangdong Sheng, China
Creation Date: between 1878 and 1880

The carriers dressed in a clean, white summer uniform, barefooted. The front carrier looked ahead while the back carrier curiously peaked at the camera.



Title: Mr. & Mrs. Cartwright

Description: William Cartwright, Chinese Maritime Customs Service commissioner; his wife, sitting on a horse; and an unidentified Chinese groom.

Place: Beijing, China
Creation Date: 1892 June

The groom was dressed in a professional outfit with one hand on the horse leash and the other holding a whip. Looking towards the camera, he seemed focused and assertive.
